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**CITY RELEASES FIRST DRAFT MAP AS PART OF
REZONE SYRACUSE, TO HOST SERIES OF PUBLIC
FORUMS SEEKING COMMUNITY INPUT**

*ReZone Syracuse Will Host Four Quadrant-Based Meetings to Answer Questions,
Provide Information About First Draft Zoning Map*

SYRACUSE, N.Y. – The City of Syracuse has released the first draft Citywide Zoning Map as part of the ReZone Syracuse process. The map, which can be accessed at the [ReZone Syracuse website](#), will be the first of three drafts to be issued during this process. The City will host a series of four public forums encouraging residents to learn more about the process and ask questions about the new map. Staff from EDR, the ReZone Syracuse consultants, as well as the City Zoning and Planning offices, will be on hand to answer more technical questions.

About ReZone Syracuse

ReZone Syracuse is a City led project to comprehensively overhaul of the City's Zoning Ordinance & Map. First adopted in 1922 and last revised in 1967, this will be the first comprehensive revision of these regulations in 50 years. This process will affect every parcel of land in the City of Syracuse and streamline the City's

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Zoning Ordinance to make it more predictable and efficient for property owners and prospective developers. This project will provide an updated ordinance that incorporates principles of form-based codes, Smart Growth, Traditional Neighborhood Development, and Transit Oriented Development, among other current best planning and zoning practices.

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
