Chief Fowler One of 10 Veterans Honored for the Continued Public Service

Mayor Miner: Chief Fowler Has Always Been a Leader, No Matter What Uniform He Wears

SYRACUSE, N.Y. – Syracuse Police Chief Frank L. Fowler will be honored tonight at the “Still Serving” reception held by City & State, a New York-based political magazine. The reception, held at Lucille’s Bar and Grille in Manhattan, recognizes 10 veterans who continued their contributions to New York State following their military service.

“Chief Fowler has always been a leader, no matter what uniform he wears. During his active duty time, his years in the reserves, and his lengthy career as a Syracuse Police officer, the Chief has always lived his call to service,” said **Syracuse Mayor Stephanie A. Miner**. “I am pleased he has served as my Chief of Police for my entire term in office and I thank him for demonstrated dedication he shows to his country and his community.”

I have spent my life serving the Syracuse community, whether at home or abroad, keeping our families safe,” said **Chief of Police Frank L. City & State hosts this reception each year to recognize veterans who continue to serve their communities after retiring from military service. Frank Fowler was appointed Chief of Police by Mayor Miner on January 1, 2010. Since then, he has worked to improve the use of data and technology in crime fighting. Chief Fowler has twice [been recognized](#) as a Champion of Children by Fight Crime: Invest in Kids for his advocacy and work to address the holistic causes of crime – the only person to be recognized by the organization twice. The Chief served in the United States Army for three years and spent 17 years in the United States Army Reserves and attained the rank of Sergeant First Class.
